Making verbs agree with their subjects

What are verbs and subjects?

Verbs are action words. For example:

eat, sleep, talk, walk, do, buy are all verbs.

Subjects are the person or thing who are doing the action of the verb. For example:

I eat. The dog sleeps. George talks a lot. They walk to work.

The subject of a sentence can be **singular (one)** or **plural (many).** For example:

The **computer** is old. (singular) The **computers** are old. (plural)

What is verb-subject agreement?

The verb form can **change** depending on whether the subject is singular or plural. For example:

The **car park** (singular subject) <u>was</u> (verb) full. The **car parks** (plural subject) <u>were</u> (verb) full.

In these sentences each of the verbs **agrees** with its subject. The correct verb form has been used.

The verb *must* always agree with its subject.

single subject = single verb plural subject = plural verb

How does verb-subject agreement work?

In regular verbs:

	singular	plural
First person	l <u>like</u> bananas.	We <u>like</u> bananas.
Second person	you <u>like</u> bananas.	you <u>like</u> bananas.
Third person	he/she/it <u>likes</u> bananas.	they <u>like</u> bananas.
