

Explain this - Tertiary and Quaternary Industries

Video summary	Before watching the video	During the video
<p>A short film for secondary schools explaining tertiary and quaternary industries: what they are and how they fit into the global economy.</p> <p>It covers the development of the service industries and, more recently, that of skills to support the service industry through the development of new technologies.</p>	<p>Ask students to create a list of ten different jobs. Students share the list of jobs with the rest of the class. Discuss with students what categories those jobs could fit into, are there any similarities between the types of jobs?</p> <p>Introduce key terms such as: Industry: Any economic activity which creates jobs and generates income.</p> <p>Tertiary industry: An industry that includes the selling of services and skills.</p> <p>Quaternary industry: An industry that includes supporting and developing the service industries and often involve information, technological and digital services.</p>	<p>You may wish to stop at relevant points during this short film to pose questions and check understanding or wait until the end. Useful questions might include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Where do industries begin? • What is the tertiary sector? • Give examples of jobs in the tertiary sector. • What is the quaternary sector? • Give examples of jobs in the quaternary sector. • What are the biggest industries in the UK?

<p>After watching this short film, students could carry out a study of the industries in their local area; what are the main types of industry present and how have these changed over time?</p> <p>Ask students to create a list of jobs that are part of each sector. Research could be carried out into countries where a high number of jobs are available in each of the tertiary and quaternary sectors.</p>
