



BBC Champions Music workshop

Aaron Copland 1900-1990 Hoedown from Rodeo (1942)

Aims:

- Introduce the melodic material Copland used to compose the piece
- Use pulse as a key element of the workshop
- Use phrases to learn the melodies of the piece
- Explore some of the rhythmic content of the piece through the medium of body percussion
- Layer melodic content and rhythmic content to produce a piece
- Share a new short piece composed collaboratively based on key concepts of the composition

Structure

- 1. Warm up pulse related game
- 2. Listen to the piece (twice)
- 3. Activities related to the piece
- 4. Sharing

Listening Questions:

- 1. How do you feel when you listen to this piece?
- 2. Where in the world might you hear music like this?
- 3. What place do you think you might be in when you hear this music?

Encourage movement: note how children move to the piece –and sharing of moves.

Activities:

- 1. Warm up Hoedown Yeehaa, passes it on in the direction it is already going | Haybarn, skips a person, hands above the head in roof position | Hoedown, blocks and sends it back the other way (fist downwards motion, opposite arm to the direction of travel).
- 2. Warm up Two circles:

Pulse, in a circle walking together in time, clapping on beat, walking round in

opposite direction, counting in 2/4 not 4/4.

Stage 2 – resting for set amount of bars, feeling pulse together, ask pupils to count in in 2/4

- 3. Off and on the beat 2 groups walking in opposite directions, one group on the beat the other off the beat, then stop for 4bars before switching rhythm and direction.
- Offbeat semiquavers As above but clapping twice off the beat instead of once.



Working in pairs outside circle facing inside | Inside circle facing outside. – Include 4 bars of 2/4 rest. On 4th bar of rest all move to your right. Continue with the rhythm with new partners.

5. Hoedown- vocal warm up – sing D Major scale, 1, 121, 12321 etc...

(Piano accompaniment)

Question and answer – melodic phrases based on D major scale first five notes – using numbers and /or sol fah. Created in pairs | shared with the rest of the group | whole group sings each phrase back.

Create your melody with this rhythm:



Extension activity – use all 8 notes of D Major scale and use note names.

Have a Hoedown with all the material you have created! Rhythmic and Melodic!
