


Tempo is measured in beats per minute (BPM). The pulse of the music controls the tempo. Italian words are often used to describe tempo.

The tempo can change during a piece of music.

How loudly or quietly music should be played



CLASSICAL MUSIC

Loud forte

Quiet piano


Italian words and abbreviations are used for dynamics in music.

Symbol	Italian	English	Symbol	Italian	English
pp	pianissimo	very quiet	f	forte	loud
p	piano	quiet	ff	fortissimo	very loud
mp	mezzo piano	moderately quiet	<	crescendo	getting louder
mf	mezzo forte	moderately loud	>	diminuendo	getting quieter







Rhythm

Patterns of sounds that have different durations, played in time with the pulse






Example rhythm:

Structure

How a piece of music is organised (also called form)

CLASSICAL MUSIC

Songs or pieces of music can be made up of contrasting musical sections. These different sections can be labelled (A, B, C etc) to help us understand the structure of a piece of music.

In a song, the verse could be A and the chorus B.



Pitch

How high or low a sound is





The piccolo is SMALL and can play very HIGH sounds




The double bass is LARGE and can play very LOW sounds

Texture

How instrumental or vocal layers are combined



Thin

Thick

Monophonic

A single melody, with no harmony

Homophonic

Melody with harmony



Two or more independent melodies

Timbre

A word we use to describe the character or colour of a musical sound
Timbre is pronounced: TAM-bruh
