## Going on a shopping adventure

WHAT: Turn your shopping trip into an adventure by making up a story with your little one.


WHY: Making up stories is a great way to get your little one to use their imagination.

HOW: We have created an adventure story for you to do with your little one.

This will encourage them to start talking about the things they see around the supermarket and help them learn new words.

## How to play

- 1. Look at the outline of the Teddy in the box and let your child draw its eyes, nose and mouth to make a face.
- 2. Fill in the gaps in each sentence by writing or drawing objects your little one can see or likes. (There are no wrong answers!)
- **3.** Read the story you have created together.



One day, Teddy went to the supermarket with Teddy's family.

Teddy was so excited to see all the food inside the shop.

Teddy could see lots of lovely fruit and vegetables.

### **Top Tips for younger children**

Playing 'hide and seek' with a toy is a great game and gives children lots of opportunity to talk about where their toy is hiding.

### Top Tips for older children

- You could be creative and make your own character to join you on a shopping trip.
- It could be a simply-decorated wooden spoon or a character made out of recycled items.
- Think of a good name for the character and take it on a shopping adventure.
- Talk about what happened next.
- Use what, where and why questions e.g where will teddy go? What will teddy do?
- Ask them about what they can hear or smell on their adventure.

## The wheels on the bus



## Sort the shopping game

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
WHAT: Supermarkets are full of lots of different sized items which are often stacked on shelves to keep them organised.

WHY: Sorting objects into different sizes helps children notice the differences and similarities between them.

HOW: Look at the activity below with your little one and talk about the different sizes of the items.

## 1 Tall and short

- 1. Below there are two pictures of stacked cereal boxes. Talk about which is tall and which is short.
- 2. Draw a circle around the tallest one.




## 2 Sorting Sizes

**1.** Look at the items on the checkout belt and discuss...

Which item is the tallest? Which is the shortest? Which is the widest? Which is the thinnest?


2. Help your child draw a...
Triangle around the shortest item.
Square around the widest item.
Circle around the thinnest item.



## 3 Ordering Sizes

Talk about the items on the checkout belt and which order they would go in if they were arranged...

- 1. Shortest to tallest
- 2. Thinnest to widest



## **Top Tips for younger children**

- For young children, it is fun to measure their height against a wall or door frame.
- You can use tape to mark off heights and add a date.
- Do this every month and look at the previous height so they can see how much they've grown – say 'you have grown taller!'

## Top Tips for older children

- Stacking tins and boxes is a great way for children to practise counting skills.
- Sitting on the floor, they can stack and count your tins or your boxes.
- Start with stacking 1, 2, 3 items then work up to 5.

## What's in our shopping bag?

WHAT: This simple matching game can help children link the name of an item to the object they can see.

WHY: Talking about and naming items that little ones are interested in, can help them learn words quicker.

**HOW:** Look at the items in the box. Can you match the silhouettes to the matching picture?

When matching the pictures to the silhouettes with your child talk about each of the different items.

## **Top Tips for younger children**

- Play 'What's in the bag?' with your shopping.
- Keep a few items in your bag.
- Let your little one take a look (they might need a clue!) and then put them back in the bag to start the game.
- Say "Shake, shake, shake what's in the bag?, let's look and see".
- Pull an item out of the bag and name it.
   Talk about the colour and what you do with it.

## **Top Tips for older children**

- Play 'What's in the bag?' with your shopping.
- Ask your child 'What's in the bag?' Get them to describe what they can feel.
- Ask questions whilst they are feeling the item in the bag, for example, 'Is it big or small?' 'Is it hard or soft?'
- Do they belong in the fruit or vegetable aisle?
- You can play too. Describe the item before you reveal it.
- For example, you could say 'It feels hard and curved, it has beans inside it'...show it's a can.


## Food matching game


Draw a line to match the fruit and vegetables that are the same.


Talk about which pictures are the same and which are different and why.

You could talk about the colours by saying, 'This one is yellow and curved, and this one is the same.

They are both bananas. They match!'







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## **Crafty creations**

WHAT: Get Crafty! Use the packaging from your shopping to build all sorts of fun characters and creations. A great way to get your little ones focused whilst improving their concentration and attention span!

WHY: Talking about what you are going to create together and the type of packaging vou're going to use (e.g cereal boxes, yoghurt pots, egg box, milk carton) can help develop your child's vocabulary.

**HOW:** Follow the instructions below to make your very own crafty creation out of scrap packaging.

## How to play

Gather your scrap packaging: You can use any scrap paper or

cardboard to make your creation. **Get creating:** Help your child cut,

### How to make a flower

- 1. Cut around the egg shape cups of the box.
- **2.** Then cut triangle shapes into the side of the egg cups to make the petals.
- **3.** Bend the triangles back, colour in your flower and stick it onto a stick or piece of paper.



### How to make a spider

1. Cut around two egg shape cups of the box. Stick them (by gluing the edges) to the middle of a piece of paper or card to make the body.

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- 2. Fold the cereal box into long thin strips and tear these to create 8 legs (or you could use safety scissors).
- **3.** Fold the rectangle legs in the middle to make the legs bend! Stick the ends to the paper around the spider's body.



### paste and colour. **Be creative:** Your child might also

want to decorate their creation using coloured pens, pencils or paint.

## Top Tips for younger children

- For younger children, they may really enjoy the sensory experience of tearing paper or card packaging. An old magazine or cereal box is perfect.
- Help them to explore what it feels like, talk about the bumpy edges or the sounds it makes when you tear paper.

### Top Tips for older children

- At home, have a go at making your own characters using recycled items.
- Help your child to join or stick the different types of packaging together.
- Talk about their character: their arms, legs and face.
- This is a brilliant way for your little one to learn new words like 'shoulder', 'wrist' and 'ankle'.



















## Going on a journey


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WHAT: The journey to and from your shopping trip is a great time to talk to your little one about wha<mark>t they can see around them</mark> e.g. people, birds, flats, houses, cars, buses, flowers.

WHY: Talking about what your child likes or is interested in can help them learn new words. It also shows them that you are interested in their thoughts and ideas. **HOW:** Use this line drawing activity to talk about your journey.

## How to play

- 1. Look at the picture of the supermarket and talk about where it is. Is it city, town or in a village? Is it near the countryside?
- Next, look at the door of the home and talk about what your door is like. You could draw what's next to your door e.g. windows. Talk about who lives there with you or you could draw simple stick people to represent your family.
- Draw a line to include all the places and things you might see you on your journey. Make sure the line keeps going to join up the supermarket to the home.
- 4. Talk about what you see near the supermarket and what you see near your home. Use the picture ideas to help you add some more things to your 'line journey' home.



### Top Tips for younger children

- Don't worry if you mainly focus on the line.
- Talk about making the line wiggly or wavy like the sea.
- Drawing lines is a great way to play and practise mark-making.

## Top Tips for older children

- Turn your journey into a memory game and get your child to think of all the things you saw on your journey. How many can you name?
- If your child likes drawing, talk about the other things you might find on your journey and draw them. It's great to talk about the places they like to go and are important to them.


## **Nursery rhyme**







## **Ispy**

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


## How to play


- 1. Look at the pictures in all three boxes and name them with your child.
- 2. Choose an item and say 'I spy' something that is -

The colour green

- ...get your child to guess which picture you have picked.
- 3. Talk about each object and whether you have seen it before.
- 4. Draw a circle around the things that you spot or have spotted on your journey today.







## **Top Tips for younger children**

• Notice what your child is looking at and play I Spy with the object e.g if they are looking at a blue ball start the game with 'I spy with my little eye something that is blue'.

### **Top Tips for older children**

- Can you spot colours on your way?
- Can you spot patterns on your way?
- Look for spots, stripes and zig zags and describe what they look like e.g a pedestrian crossing is stripy.
